Medicines that should not be crushed.

It is important for pharmacists, Drs and nursing staff to be aware of potential problems which may occur when administering medicines to patients who experience difficulty with swallowing solid dosage forms. It is often incorrectly assumed that it is ok to crush tablets. eMIMS contains a reference page which provides information on medicines that should not be crushed. This list has been compiled and recently updated for MIMS by Jenny Gowan PhD, and Mrs Robyn Saunders BPharm, Consultant pharmacists, from MediCom Medication Management Services.
